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
Drag/Drop History

Eclipse 9:

In the "Translate" section of Eclipse Version 9 User Settings, there's a new "History" button right next to "Translation Magic." It can help you adjust your steno keyboard. In the example that I'm showing here, you can see that I have a strong tendency to drag the "U" key in my steno strokes, and I also tend to drop the "A" key. With this in mind, I might want to adjust my steno writer, making the "U" a bit less sensitive and the "A" a bit more sensitive.

This drag/drop history 73 comes from your globaling in Eclipse 9. Specifically, when you select a choice from the Global Magic



suggestions or when you select an AutoMagic choice that shows a number in parentheses, it may be a result of intelligent phonetics or misstroke analysis. If the suggestion comes from misstroke analysis, Eclipse 9 tracks which keys have been dragged or dropped.

Please note: If you simply type over an untran or a mistran, or if you simply type into the Globaling dialogue, that does NOT add to the drag/drop history. You have to actually select a choice from the GlobalMagic or AutoMagic suggestions.

For now, the drag/drop history simply helps you to adjust your steno keyboard. However, this information will be used to improve Translation Magic. Knowing what keys you tend to drag/drop, Eclipse Version 10 will personalize its suggestions to deal with misstrokes.

Eclipse 9: Splitting 1 Mic Input into 2 Channels



A typical computer's microphone input is stereo, with a left channel and a right channel. With Eclipse Version 9, you can use a Y-adapter, connect two microphones, and get two audio recordings. One of the many ways this could be helpful is if you positioned one mic by your computer and another mic at

the end of a long deposition table or, in court, by the judge for sidebar.

Here's a Hosa YMM-261 Stereo Breakout 1/8" Male to Dual 1/8" TS Female Cables that I found for \$5.45 at Zzounds.com.



You'll want to see how to set this up within Eclipse Version 9. Let's go to User Settings, Realtime, Audio Recording.

I used the "Add channel" button to add Channel 1 and then Channel 2, but in each case I was indicating the same audio device, the mic input that the Y-adapter is plugged into. What would normally be the left audio track will be Channel 1, set as Input 1. What would normally be the right audio track will be Channel 2, set as Input 2. My two mics are each making a separate audio recording, so I can focus on one recording or the other, if necessary. However, I'll generally want to hear both mics at the same time, so I've set Channel 0 as Input Mix.

In the end I have one recording that mixes Channels 1 and 2, plus a separate recording for Channel 1, plus a separate recording for Channel 2.

What microphones would I connect to the female ends of the Y-adapter? There are many possibilities, but I'll mention the boundary mics that are available from SoundProfessionals.com.

They're small and you can order them with the cable length that you need. So I might get one mic to sit beside my computer (with a standard cable length) and then a second mic with a longer cable to



place near the judge for sidebar discussions..

The audio features in Eclipse Version 9 are enormously flexible, so don't hesitate to call the folks in tech support to see how the software can best fit your situation.
