Creating an Eclipse Autoreplacement in the Globaling Dialogue



Has this ever happened to you? You're working on a transcript within Eclipse. You want to type in a missing word, like "matter". However, your finger slips and you type: **mattre**

You can teach Eclipse to automatically replace "mattre" with "matter". Whenever you type "mattre" and press the Enter key or the spacebar or any punctuation key (in other words, something that is not a letter or a number), then the autoreplacement would kick in.

This is nothing new, but it may be news to some people. Just go to the "Programming" section of Eclipse user settings, select "Autoreplacements", click on "Modify" and then add this line:

```
mattre=matter
```

You could also set up a shortcut to be an autoreplacement for a phrase that keeps coming up. Here's an example:

```
wcb=Worker's Compensation Board
```

So far so good. **However, you can also create an autoreplacement while in the Globaling dialogue. There's even a Visualizer that shows how this can be done.** While you're in the Globaling dialogue, you can press F1 to open the Help page that includes a Visualizer icon. Also, you do NOT need steno to work in the Globaling dialog.

Let's say that I type "wcb" in my transcript, and I want to replace that with "Worker's Compensation Board" AND I also want to teach Eclipse that this will be a shortcut that I want to be able to use whenever I need to type in that phrase. I could use the globaling dialogue to do all of this at the same time.

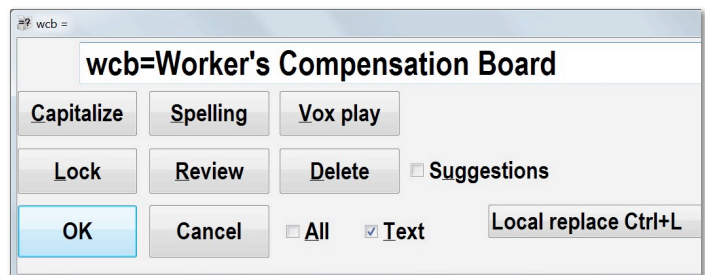
Let me break this down, step by step:

First, I'll **type** in "wcb". (Case-specific! WCB or Wcb or wCB, etc. could all mean different things.)

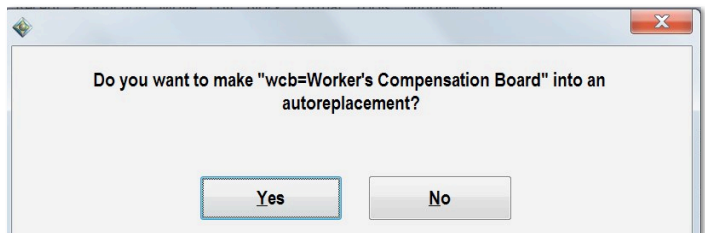
Second, I'll **mark** "wcb" and **press Ctrl G** (or use Hyperkey g) to open the Globaling dialogue.

Third, I'll **add on** to "wcb" so that it reads like this: "wcb=Worker's Compensation Board"

Fourth, I'll **click on "Text" because the replacement has nothing to do with steno.** I'll also **select "Local replace."**



Fifth, when I click on "OK", Eclipse asks:



At this point I could just click on "Yes" (or press the Enter key) and that sets up "wcb" as an autoreplacement. It's not job-specific. I can use this shortcut on any job. To remove the shortcut, I would go to User Settings, Programming, Autoreplacements and remove this line: wcb=Worker's Compensation Board.

Another Eclipse "First" in AccuCap 6

YouTube captioning greatly expands the demand for realtime captioners, and it's only available with new AccuCap 6.

The 21st Century Communications and Video Accessibility Act of 2010 requires captioning on devices that receive or display programming over the Internet. Thus, Google enlisted Eclipse help to develop live captioning on YouTube.

Under User Settings/Realtime, the output types include "YouTube Captioning." It has its own method of communications, so the COM setting is ignored.

Size, position, etc., are controlled by the YouTube side, so the presentation-specific settings like caption rows, colors, and blanking are ignored; but things like flush word delay and force margins still apply.

Of great importance is the URL/Header setting. When captioning a YouTube live event, you will need to get the URL for the event, which includes the

event id and special keys, and copy/paste it into this text box.

This is a technology that requires extra coordination with the event organizers. YouTube live events are actually 30 seconds or so behind real-time in order to handle all of the data buffering, so it is necessary to have a live feed of the audio that is real-time in order to provide captioning.

The YouTube output from AccuCap timecodes each word, and Google's captioning data servers take that data and, using those timecodes, interleave it with the video in the background to synchronize the captions before sending the data to the viewers.

The User settings/Document/Timecode/Offset setting can be used to adjust how early or late the captions appear for the viewers. Note that because of the time delay, it is actually possible to have captions appear slightly before the words are spoken. Many hearing-impaired viewers prefer this.
